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1974 In August a group of local stay- at- home women wanted to get involved and do things in their local community.

In **1975** Jean Wright as bursar of the Williamstown North Primary School formed a sub-committee of the school council of interested parties with a view of providing craft and sewing classes, playgroups and a coffee and current affairs group.



A building on the school grounds at the back of the canteen (in Freyer Street) was provided for the purpose.

The group reported monthly to the school council. Vi Curran was co-ordinator and Milli Von Nagy was secretary. They received a small allowance from the Williamstown Council.

Jill Hocking was appointed as the Community Education Officer for a local network of schools' community outreach programs.

In **1975** Turtle Video finished their studio at 3 Fryer St after 5 months of work. The studio was housed in the building owned by the North Williamstown Primary School which has been renovated by Community Outreach , a group of people associated with the school concerned that the school's resources should be used by the community. A series of workshops were run on Sunday afternoons at a cost of \$2 each.

The studio was available for use 24/7 and shared with Community Outreach and other community groups. Turtle Video/Wescom continued operation for 37 years at various venues in the area.

In March colour television was introduced

In **1976** a regular coffee morning for the local mums began and the first community playgroup in Williamstown was established. The first Migrant English class in Williamstown was started along with a writers' group, leather workshops, macramé classes and Kids Town Club for children.

In **1976** the Centre gained funding to run the first After School Program. A joint submission with North Williamstown Primary School saw the construction of the multi purpose hall in the grounds of the Primary School.

The Outreach programme at North Williamstown Primary School has begun an after-school children's writing project under the leadership of Pat Traynor. When the plan was first put forward, it was thought that at the most, 20 children would be interested. However, more than 20 have enrolled, from Williamstown, Newport and Spotswood. The programme is being run in the Outreach house in Freyer Street, where Ms. Traynor is pictured with her students.



In **1980** many local groups came on board and were involved with the Outreach Centre.



In **1981** the Community Outreach Centre at 3 Freyer Street North Williamstown was, under the direction of Vi Curran – Coordinator, and Richard McCracken painted with a mural by the Flying Art Squad Mural Group. The Flying Art Squad is an enthusiastic band of unemployed young people using their energy and imagination to give something that they see as useful to their community. The mural (pictured below) expresses historical, contemporary local issues on one large wall of the Community Outreach Centre.



In **1982** the first Community Services Group is established, which today is known as the Interagency Network.

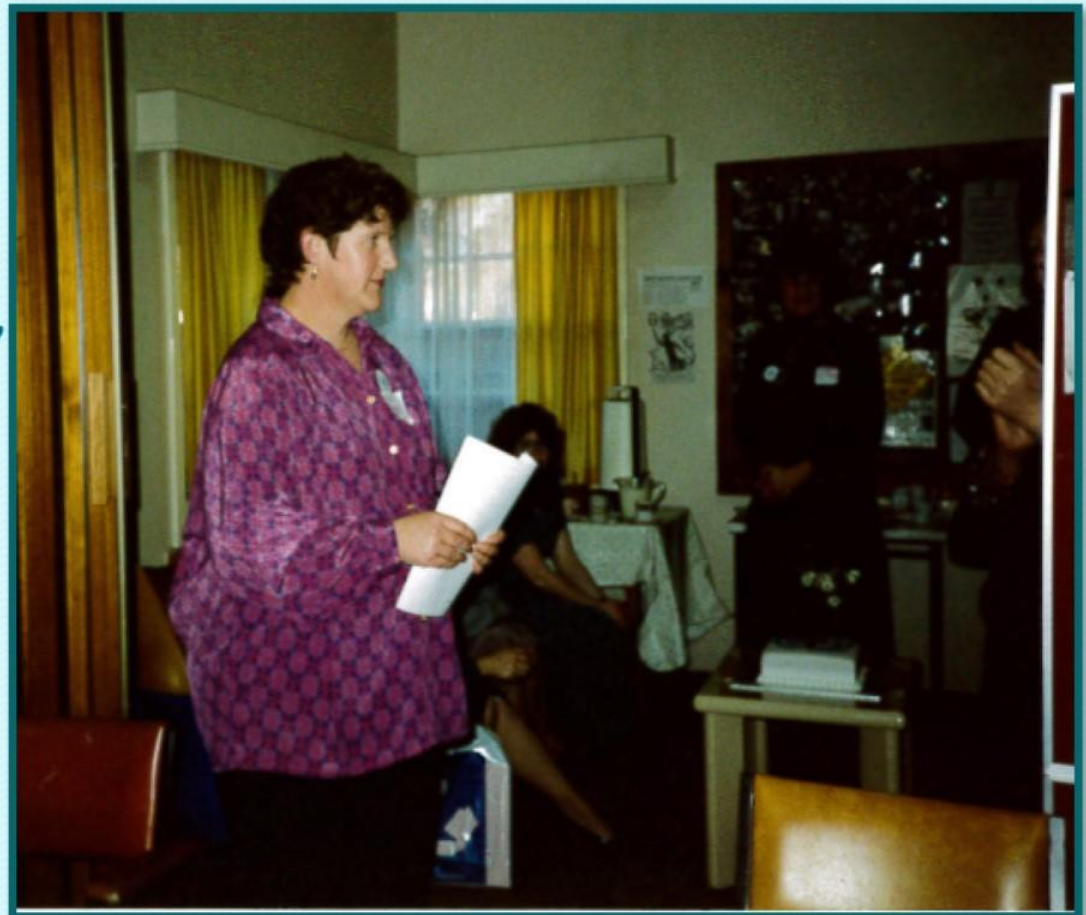

In **1986** a committee of interested parties was formed headed by Beata Peisker and Geraldine Schutt with support from Joan Dyall and Rhonda Johnson.

TAFE funding enabled the Centre to employ a Coordinator to run Adult Education, Leisure and Recreation programs for local residents.

In **1987** the organisation becomes incorporated (20/7/87) – name changes from 'Community Outreach' to 'Outreach Community Centre Inc', and no longer operates as a sub committee of Williamstown North Primary School. It now reports once a month to a board of management.

Jill Bilston is appointed Neighbourhood House Coordinator.
The organisation relocates to the Caretakers residence on the corner of Freyer Street, at 139 Melbourne Road, North Williamstown.

1988 Computer classes begin at Newport TAFE.

Childcare is available for women enrolling in courses to improve their employment options.

A craft group called Pins and Needles coordinated by Myrtle Cameron attracts up to thirty women weekly. The group continued for many years.



1989 Judy Fowler appointed Childcare Coordinator. Judy continued in the position until 2003.

1991 The Centre attracts large amounts of Federal funding for Migrant English and Literacy classes. Most of this funding supports the running of classes in Altona, Altona Meadows, Altona North and Spotswood.

1992 Opening of the new Childcare / Multipurpose extension

During the renovation some of the classes were relocated to St Stephens Uniting Church.

Mobil starts donating to our Centre. These donations continue until the present day.

Funding gained for holiday programs for disabled adults.

Lynne Hewet starts at Centre as Adult Education Coordinator at Altona.

In an average week the Centre have at least 100 pre-school children using the facility and between 450-500 adults participating in activities.



In **1992** the Centre liaise and share information with similar groups in the region and state via membership of the Community Provider Committee of the Regional Further Education Council, Western Association of Community Centres, Association of Neighbourhood Houses and Learning Centres and Community Services Group.



1992 saw the Outreach Centre run computer classes at the Yarraville Community Centre. Classes cost \$40 for 9 weeks.

In **1993** the Centre runs a Career Information Session for job seekers over 45 years of age at the Williamstown Town hall. Over 350 people attend the activities.

The Centre, in response to high unemployment in the community received funding to run two training/employment projects.

Green House cleaning and Library skills. The greenhouse Cleaning Training Program for isolated community members with limited skills expands to Greenhouse Cleaning and is registered as a business. Green House Cleaning trained two groups of people in the area who are now employed as domestic cleaners with another group to finishing training in July 1993.



1994 Council amalgamations – Williamstown Council and Altona Council amalgamate under the name Hobsons Bay City Council.

Due to commitment to assisting those with disabilities, Centre gains official Public Benevolent Institution status. This status is very rare in the sector.

An adult holiday program was conducted over the Christmas and Easter period for lonely and isolated people in the community.

Program was funded by City of Williamstown and Footscray Council.

1995 In response to high local unemployment and living in an area fast becoming an important Tourist Precinct, the Centre begins the first Training sessions in Tourist Guiding.

In **1996** activities were run from Spotswood House, Altona North Community Centre, Altona Library, Altona North Migrant Resource Centre, Yarraville Community Centre, Williamstown Tenants Assoc., Nelson Place Community Facility, Richmond Fellowship in Melbourne Road, and the portable classroom at the Williamstown North Primary School.

1997 saw the beginning of the Heritage Walks. The group started with ten people. Allan and Sue Searls continued to attend the walks for over 10 years. The group was lead by John Becroft. The objectives of the walks are to enhance our knowledge of the local heritage, to have a bit of leisurely exercise and to socialise. The group continued for over 20 years.



1998 Centre gets a new name.

'Outreach Community Centre' becomes 'Williamstown Community and Education Centre'. Rationale is due in part to establish Registered Training Organisation status.

Centre receives Outstanding Provider of the Year Award from ALA during Adult Learners Week.

Green House Cleaning was sold to two women who graduated from the original course in 1995.

The Centre made its first appearance on the Internet. The website was vicnet.net.au/~outcc

With financial assistance from Mobil Oil and Tenix Defence Systems the Centre was able to set up a Computer Room and start teaching classes.

1999 The Spotswood Community House to have a makeover thanks to Victoria University Work for the Dole scheme. The House to have new paint, new veranda and landscaped front garden, with a new disabled access pathway.

Fabulous Friday Workshops continue to be a great success. Some of the workshops offered are: Folk Art, Paper Mache Pinata, Patchwork, Asthma management, Risotto and Paella making, Skin Care and Make-up, Women and Investment.



Six sessions of Occasional Care running : four mornings and two afternoons - Judy Fowler (Coordinator) with Pat McDonald and Doris Miller.



In **2000** A Debutante Ball for young adults with an intellectual disability was held at the Williamstown Town Hall attended by over three hundred friends and family. Sixteen young adults were presented to the mayor of Hobsons Bay Cr. Carl Marsich. Mobil Altona Refinery gave a donation of \$6,000 toward the cost of the evening.

TRIBUTE TO VI CURRAN

In 1973 State Legislation allowed the opening of schools for community use. North Williamstown's supportive Principal, Matt Myers, gave his consent to a group of active parents to test school/community involvement. North Williamstown's primary School Centenary Celebrations in 1974 was the springboard for Community Outreach being established.

This was the brainchild of Vi Curran who was such a forward thinker, years ahead with her ideas. She was fully supported by Matt Myers the principal, who like Vi had visions of the school buildings being opened up and used by the whole of the community by offering programs aimed at bringing adults into the school at evenings and weekends. During the weekend of the school's Centenary celebrations, the whole of the community were involved.

Vi organised for local groups and clubs to use classrooms in order to show what they did. She also arranged for ethnic groups to entertain the crowds with their own National dancing and cultures, and this was some 28 years ago! The first evening classes to be held at the school were "Learning Japanese" with Matt Myers and crocheting with Iris Whitehurst.

This was a first for a government school in Victoria to open up its doors for classes for adults. Vi worked tirelessly on a voluntary basis seeking out tutors, liaising with the school and organising courses. The After School Program commenced and Vi worked hard applying for grants to expand the program. Through successful grants new facilities including the multi purpose hall, the dental unit and a new home for Outreach Community Centre were added to this progressively thinking school.

The success of the Community Outreach Program became too demanding for the dedicated volunteers; thus the need for paid personnel. In 1976 Williamstown City Council funded two part time positions. Vi Curran with her clear vision of Community Outreach was appointed Community Education Officer. Vi continued to work tirelessly with parents, community and school and with local government in determining community needs and developing links with other community services.

We salute and thank Vi for her vision of community support and development. In the International Year of the volunteer we remember Vi and all the volunteers who worked so hard to make Williamstown the very special place it is to live in today.

2002 On the 10th July the Premier of Victoria The Honourable Steve Bracks handed over the key to the Williamstown Courthouse to Mayor of Hobsons Bay Cr. Angela Altair and the Williamstown Community Centre.



2003 The first week of February 2003 the Centre moved from Melbourne Road to Joan Kirner House which was our home for 17 years.

The Centre relocated in February and the refurbishment was completed in May. Several classes operated throughout this time. Computer classes continued at Melbourne Road until mid April.



2003 The official opening of the new Courthouse venue was held on the 21st of March. The Premier the Hon Steve Bracks officially launched the event and called on Mrs Kirner, the former Premier of Victoria to receive the honour of the site being named after her, to recognise the excellent work she has done for Victoria and the local community.



2003 With so much more space, the Centre is been able to increase all its programs and activities. The Centre commences a new After School Program, Mini Maestro's Music Program, Kumon and many more local groups.

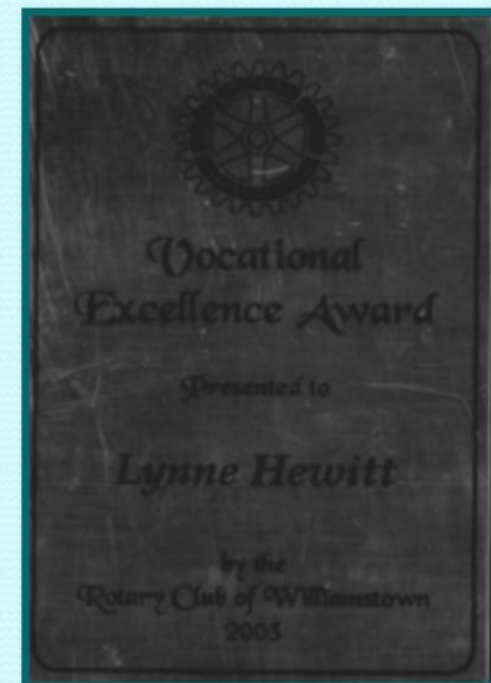
The After School Program for Williamstown and St Marys Primary School uses Joan Kirner House as its new home.

The Centre expands its childcare and playgroup activities. Hundreds of children use the childcare room each week.


The Federal funded Migrant English and Literacy classes grow rapidly in numbers. More classes are developed.

Spotswood Community House receives a new and continuing Coordination grant from the Department of Human Services.

2003 On the 10th June 2003, the Honourable Nicola Roxon, Federal Member for Gellibrand presented Jill Bilston, our Centre Manager, the Centenary Medal for services to Adult Education and the development of the West, and to Lynne Hewet, Adult Education Coordinator, the Vocational Excellence Award from the Rotary club of Williamstown for her outstanding contribution to Adult Education.



In **2003** Mobil Altona Refinery donates \$11,000 to the Centre to cover the cost of leasing computers. Minister Lynne Kosky, Minister for Education and Training officially opens the Mobil Computer Room with Mr Mike McGrath, Manager of Mobil Altona Refinery.

2005 Federal funded programs bring over 30 nationalities to our Centre to improve English and Literacy levels.

A Carers painting group starts, to support the carers of the elderly frail and disabled, to give carers a break.

Joan Kirner House gets a disabled toilet.

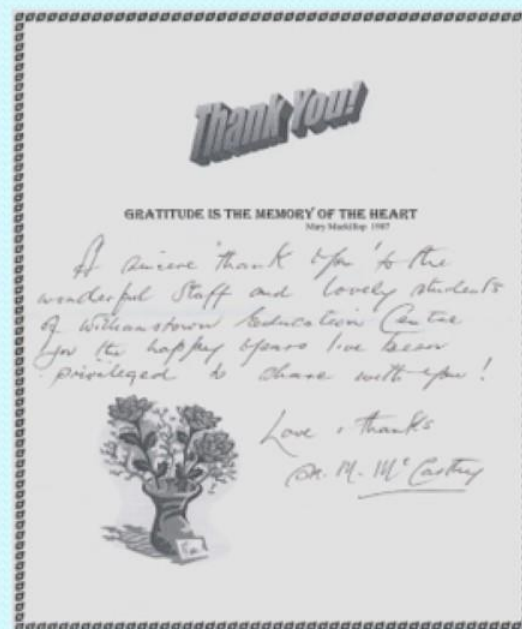
Spotswood Community House and Joan Kirner House staff develop a Men's Shed in the Spotswood area. This project provides activities to support socially isolated and disabled older men.

Men's Shed is established in Ann Street Williamstown, with support from Yarraville Community Centre, Council, Laverton Community Centre and Victoria University.

2005 Pelicans Three Year Old Activity Group commences with Catherine Paleologoudias as Coordinator.
The back block of Joan Kirner House is soil tested and planning starts for the development of a mini playground for Centre run activities.



In **2006** long time volunteer Sister McCarthy, who the Centre nominated as Senior Citizen of the Year. Although she did not win, she was awarded a certificate which she proudly displayed.



2006 Emergency Relief begins. Jenny Peace is employed to support the many volunteers who deliver the program and provide counselling and referrals to the appropriate agencies. Playgroups include Gumnuts and Children with Disabilities. Bone Boosters, Yoga and Pilates commence. Lynne receives Good Access Award for the Disabled from Council.

2007 The drama class for people with an intellectual disability 'Wakety Pals' started. With staff guidance the group is run with the participants as the primary motivators. They engage in drama games, movement to music and work to create a short performance.

Different activities are experienced each week from making place mats, greeting cards, jewellery to dancing, singing, charades, playing football. Once in a while the group chooses to go out to La Porchetta for a Pizza Meal.



2007 With the assistance of a Community Building Initiatives Small Grant 2006/2007 from Hobsons Bay City Council, Spotswood Community House and Williamstown Community and Education Centre have continued supporting and developing the establishment of a local Men's Shed.

The Hobson's Bay Network was formed and have successfully applied for DPCD funding, under the umbrella of Hobsons Bay City Council. Spotswood Community House is the Administrative support centre for the network.



2008 On the 14th September 2008 a Community Concert was hosted by Willin Wimmin. The group was formed in 1991 and is currently led by Jennifer Lund. The choir is a place where we foster cooperation, validation and mutual respect through singing together.

2008 in December the All Abilities Bocce League Grand Final (The Maltese Bocce Social and Recreation Club) was won by the Williamstown Community and Education Centre – 7 to 4. David House was runner up.

Lesley Orrell, the Access for All Abilities Officer from HBCC, has been working with community organisations to promote sport and recreation opportunities for people with a disability.



2009 Setting up and running the Public Access Computer which allows the community to have free internet access using a computer located in the foyer at the WCEC.

Centre starts delivering Pre – Accredited and Accredited training for State Government.

Disability access has been improved at Williamstown with the installation of a new ramp and automatic opening door to the rear of the building.

Spotswood community Centre formed a partnership with Victoria University's 'Work for the Dole' Community Initiatives Program (VUCIP) to undertake a much needed 'makeover' of the House.



2009 A great initiative was undertaken through partnership with ISIS Primary Care, Western Region Health Centre Staff at Floyd Lodge, Williamstown Primary School, the Men's Shed and our Centre in applying for and receiving a Hobsons Bay Community Grant to develop a "Community Garden" for the residents at Floyd Lodge. The interested residents were allocated a "tub" to plant and nurture their own garden plot. A series of mosaic workshops was offered at our centre for Floyd Lodge residents. Our tutor Heather and the students created pots, totem poles, and a beautiful mosaic birdbath.



2010 New Federal Government Language, Literacy and Numeracy Program commences.

State Government funding, compliance and regulatory environment requires sector to adapt quickly.

‘Sailability – The Next Step’. Sailing Program for people with disabilities. A partnership with Hobsons Bay City Council, Yachting Victoria and the Royal Yacht Club of Victoria.

2010 The Karen (Burma) community with the help and partnership of the Williamstown Community and Education Centre, Laverton P12 College, Centre for Multicultural Youth (Learning Beyond the Bell), ISIS, Time Help and a wonderful band of volunteers and tutors continued the work of the homework support group to give children and young people individual attention at a regular homework club.



2011 New Logo introduced. Association membership increases from 6 to over 50. Mobil donates 12 iPads.

Our Centre was fortunate to gain funding from the Department of Planning and Community Development in partnership with Vicnet, a division of the State Library of Victoria through the Community ICT Skills Grants.

The launch was on Friday 20th April and was well attended by Wade Noonan MP, The Hon. Joan Kirner, representatives from many local agencies and students.



2012 To ensure the operational sustainability of the Centre into the future a restructure of the organisation was implemented. Mark Brophy was appointed as the new Centre Manager.



Aside from our houses at Williamstown and Spotswood, we are now delivering services to our local community at over seven separate locations, from the Senior Citizens' Club in Williamstown and Dulcie Shaw House in Altona North to St. Stephen's in Williamstown and the Migrant Resource Centre in Newport.

2012 Scholarships through VET Development Centre for all teachers to upgrade qualifications.

Successful State Government grant to improve pre – training reviews, enrolment process, etc to increase efficiencies.

Julie Hanna was the driving force behind the Spotswood Food & Garden Swap.

Under the direction of Jenni and Barry Mitchell,

Conversations for the Curious conducted several sessions and workshops at the Senior Citizens' Centre in Williamstown.

Teachers across all programs ensure their students have considerable exposure and involvement in local community activities and excursions.



In **2012** an important community project undertaken was the participation of some of our students in the opening of the new Williamstown Library's Time Capsule Project. This involved students writing their stories about their journey to Australia and their first impressions of their life in Australia. The diversity of our students is also noteworthy as we have students as young as 18 and others who are in their eighties.

They come from all over the world including Argentina, Brazil, China, Columbia, Croatia, Ecuador, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Korea, Latvia, Malaysia, Spain, Vietnam, Nepal, and the Philippines just to name a few.



In **2013** the MID Art class contributed to the Dreams ArtAbility 2012 Exhibition. This exhibition unites a range of talented artists of all ages from a variety of cultures who are living with a disability. The Exhibition was held at the 'Atrium' Federation Square. Tutor Claire Hynes assisted by Cheryl from David House.



2013 Cathy Paleologoudias and Carol Willis receive Inspirational Woman Awards from Hobsons Bay City Council.

The Centre foyer was given a clean and bright facelift with the brown bricks being painted a fresh cream colour.

Other Improvements included a New sandpit in Childcare (Thanks to Simon Zdraveski and Joncol Building), new floor in our childcare facility and an automatic door upgrade in the foyer making this venue safer for children.



2013 Centre receives 3 year Federal Government Skills for Education and Employment Program contract.
Emergency Relief handed over to Anglicare. Jenny Peace moves to new education administration role at Centre.
Another Spotswood Community Centre revamp starts. Has it really been 12 years since the last one!! Work undertaken by Work for the Dole participants and Matchworks.



2014 The 'Our People Tree' by Paula and Claire became a feature on the foyer wall.

Paula catalogued our teacher resources, which was much appreciated by all our teaching staff.

A comprehensive history of our Centre 1974-2014 was compiled and presented as part of our 40th year celebration.



2014 Jenny Peace and Lynne Hewet receive Inspirational Woman Awards from Hobsons Bay Council. Student and teacher excursions included a visit to Parliament House, Surf Life Saving, Werribee Zoo, Film Festival and Multicultural Week activities.

2014 83 Cecil Street (the old Childcare Co-op.) became the new home for our Tuesday morning Childcare, with two groups running each week.

2014 Yarn Installation. – ‘Growing Together’

This installation is a patchwork of colours using recycled and forgotten yarns brought together to create a cocoon for the 120 year old Elm Tree located in the grounds of the Centre.

The installation is a combination of the cooperation and friendship of our students, centre users and staff who have combined their diverse talents from varied backgrounds and cultural influences to create this work under the direction from ‘Craft & Conversation’ tutor Claire Hynes. This project is part of the celebrations proposed for the Centres 40th Anniversary of servicing the community and the Hobsons Bay area and an entry in the Hobsons Bay ‘Art in Public Places’ event.

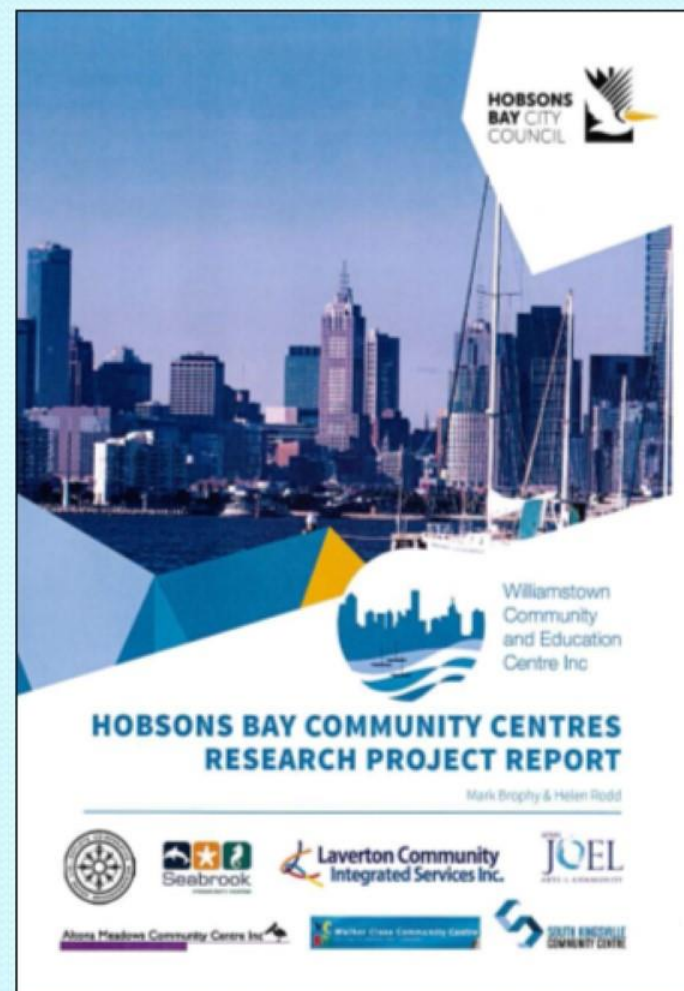

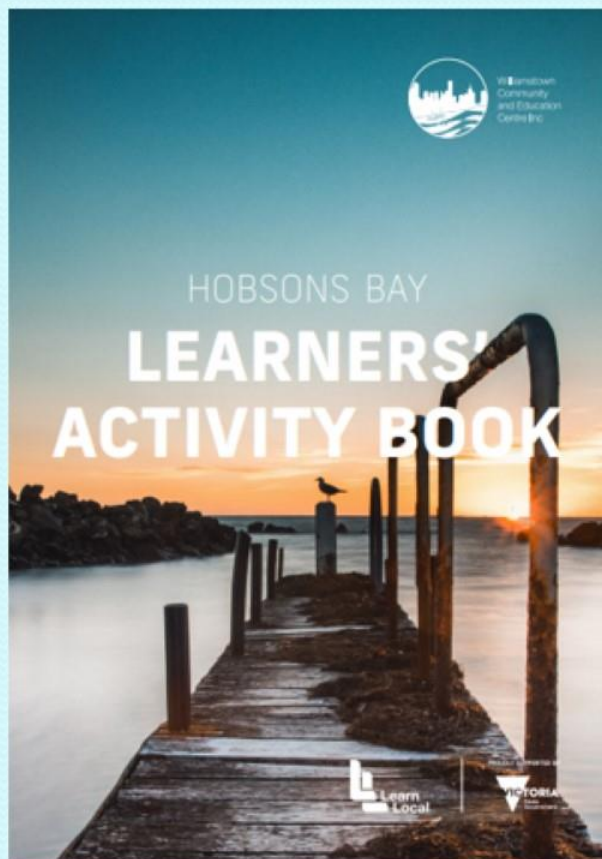
We hosted the Commonwealth Games Baton Relay.

We hosted the Volunteering Photo Exhibition, in which our President Sonja was showcased, in the foyer of Joan Kirner House.



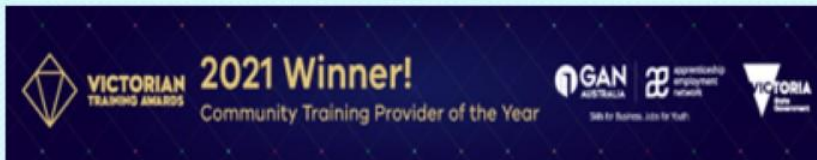
Thanks to support from Co Health we had a new Coffee Van regularly coming to our Joan Kirner House.

Thanks to Hobsons Bay City Council and support from Greater Western Water, we installed our new Recycling Made Easy Box at Joan Kirner House.

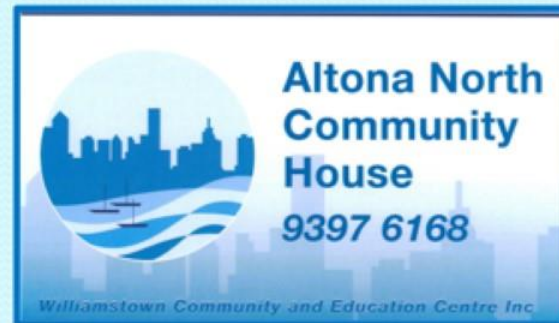

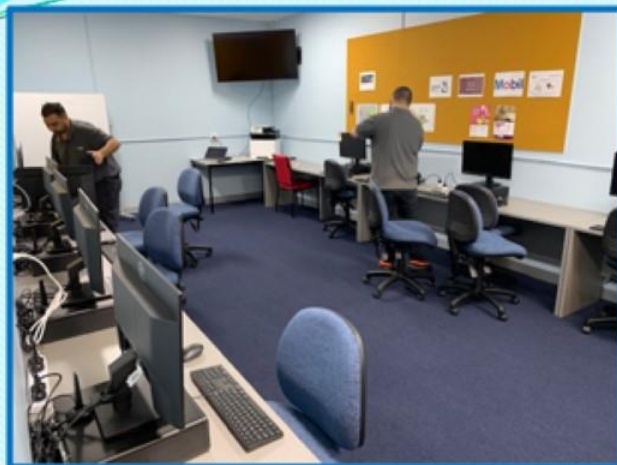
